Content Description

50 States Notebooking Pages is a research-based geography curriculum that encourages students to explore and document information about each U.S. state. Learning Objectives

Students will:

- Locate and label all 50 states and capitals on a U.S. map.
- Research and record geographic features, state symbols, and facts for each state.
- Identify and describe each state's economy, landmarks, and historical significance.
- Compare and contrast geographic regions and state characteristics.
- Develop note-taking, summarizing, and research skills.
- Strengthen informational writing and use of non-fiction resources.
- Use maps and atlases to gather spatial information.
- Build awareness of cultural and economic diversity across the United States.
- Organize findings into a personal geography notebook or portfolio.

- Map labeling and location tasks
