Meet the Presidents: Learning Record

A U.S. History and Writing Curriculum

Grade Range: 2nd-6th

Subject Focus: U.S. History, Government, Writing, Research Skills

Content Description

Meet the Presidents is a printable, student-driven curriculum that encourages historical inquiry and nonfiction writing through the study of all 45 U.S. Presidents. Each president has a dedicated notebooking page prompting students to record biographical details, presidential achievements, and key historical context.

By selecting a president and completing research using books or internet resources, students practice summarization and factual writing. This curriculum supports long-term history projects, unit studies, and independent exploration of civics and leadership in American government.

Learning Objectives

Students will:

- Identify and describe each of the 45 U.S. Presidents.
- Research key biographical and historical facts using reliable resources.
- Record presidency terms, ages, home states, and notable accomplishments.
- Write a complete paragraph or factual summary for each president.
- Organize notebooking pages to compile a chronological history of U.S. leadership.
- Understand the role and powers of the presidency.
- Recognize connections between historical events and presidential decisions.
- Build confidence in non-fiction writing, summarizing, and organizing information.

Develop long-term project skills through consistent documentation.

Scope and Sequence

Students may study presidents in chronological order or in a personalized order based on interest or unit studies. A flexible schedule allows one to multiple presidents per week.

Each notebooking page covers:

- Name and term of office
- Personal facts (age, state, background)
- Paragraph or list of accomplishments and events
- Visual layout for simple organization and retention

Ideal for use during U.S. history studies, government units, or in conjunction with Presidents' Day or patriotic themes.
